Bird List	Highlights - 110 species encountered
Common Loon	Pair with one at nest site, later heard yodeling and wailing
Double-crested Cormorant	A few seen incidentally
American Bittern	Two heard and seen calling a Pontook Marsh in Dummer, 2 seen foraging in field
Great Blue Heron	Several seen flying
Canada Goose	Heard and seen
Wood Duck	Heard making their odd alarm call while in flight
American Black Duck	A few seen and heard
Ring-necked Duck	Not really heard, but nice to see
Hooded Merganser	Ditto
Common Merganser	Ditto
Bald Eagle	Two chicks on a nest with one adult nearby - a nice treat!
Northern Harrier	A male seen carrying food to a nesting area
Broad-winged Hawk	Only one seen the whole time
Red-tailed Hawk	One seen
American Kestrel	Heard and seen in field near Dummer
Ring-necked Pheasant	Heard at Whitefield Airport
Ruffed Grouse	Hen and six chicks seen crossing the road
Wild Turkey	Three seen along the road in Dummer
Virginia Rail	Three heard calling at Pontook Marsh
Sora	One seen at Pontook, but never called
Killdeer	Several seen and heard
Common Snipe	Several seen, mostly heard the "beak beak beak" call
American Woodcock	One flushed from grass
Herring Gull	A few seen flying overhead
Arctic Tern	One seen on Cherry Pond - a very strange location and time of year
Rock Pigeon	Several seen daily in urban sites
Mourning Dove	Many heard and seen
Chimney Swift	Seen and heard every day in Gorham
Ruby-throated Hummingbird	A couple seen - not sure their squeak counts as a call or song
Belted Kingfisher	Several seen and heard rattling
Yellow-bellied Sapsucker	Numerous heard rat-a-tat-tatting in their morse code-like drumming
Downy Woodpecker	Two - calling and drumming
Hairy Woodpecker	Two - calling and drumming
Northern Flicker	Calling
Pileated Woodpecker	Seen and heard on two different days
Olive-sided Flycatcher	One heard calling on our first day
Eastern Wood-Pewee	Only one seen, but not heard!
Yellow-bellied Flycatcher	Several seen and heard making call note and plaintive whistle
Alder Flycatcher	Several seen and heard, demanding "free-beer"
Least Flycatcher	Che-bek, che-bek! Nothing "least" about this call
Eastern Phoebe	Several seen and heard
Great Crested Flycatcher	Wheep! Wheep! from the woods on two different days
Eastern Kingbird	A distinctive twitter - we heard this a couple of times
Blue-headed Vireo	Numerous heard
Warbling Vireo	We heard this species twice, with its slurry singing
Red-eyed Vireo	Heard this almost daily - loud and persistent
Gray Jay	We encountered a cute family group with 4 fledglings

Blue Jay	Mostly heard making standard calls
American Crow	Easy to identify
Common Raven	A few hoarse croaks heard and several seen flying
Tree Swallow	Twittering overhead on 4 days
Northern Rough-winged Swallow	Only one seen and heard buzzing
Bank Swallow	Only one seen and heard buzzing - slightly different than the Rough-winged
Barn Swallow	We heard and saw a couple
Black-capped Chickadee	Seen and heard almost every day
Boreal Chickadee	One heard calling on top of Cannon Mountain
Red-breasted Nuthatch	Several heard making their odd "ank ank" calls
Brown Creeper	One heard singing its beautiful quiet song
Winter Wren	The little bird with the BIG song - we got to hear numerous examples
Marsh Wren	Two heard singing at Little Cherry Pond in Jefferson
Golden-crowned Kinglet	A few of these heard making their high-pitched songs
Ruby-crowned Kinglet	One heard
Eastern Bluebird	Seen at the base of Mount Washington
Veery	Heard many of these amazing songsters, both calling and singing
Bicknell's Thrush	One seen and heard - making the veer call and singing its beautiful flute-like song
Swainson's Thrush	Heard well, especially on the Jefferson Notch Road
Hermit Thrush	A few heard - what a song!
Wood Thrush	One heard on Hazen Road in Whitefield
American Robin	Many heard and seen
Gray Catbird	A couple heard - one seemed like a Brown Thrasher style at first
Brown Thrasher	Two seen well and heard singing pairs of phrases
European Starling	A few seen and heard in urban sites
Cedar Waxwing	Small groups seen and heard on several days
Orange-crowned Warbler	Never saw the bird, but it may have been this species - if so, very unusual
Nashville Warbler	We heard many of these and saw several
Northern Parula	We heard many of these and saw several
Yellow Warbler	We heard a few of these, and saw several bright males
Chestnut-sided Warbler	We heard many of these and saw several
Magnolia Warbler	We heard many of these and saw several
Black-throated Blue Warbler	We heard many of these and saw several
Yellow-rumped Warbler	We heard many of these and saw several
Black-throated Green Warbler	We heard many of these and saw several
Blackburnian Warbler	We heard many of these and saw several
Palm Warbler	We saw and heard one at an unexpected site in Dummer
Blackpoll Warbler	Heard and seen on our "high-elevation" day
Black-and-white Warbler	We heard many of these and saw several
American Redstart	We heard many of these and saw several
Ovenbird	We heard many of these and saw several
Northern Waterthrush	Only heard two of these, with their ringing repetitive song
Mourning Warbler	Heard several - saw one really well at same site as 2005!
Common Yellowthroat	We heard many of these and saw several
Canada Warbler	We heard and saw several
Scarlet Tanager	Only a few heard - great looks at one male
Chipping Sparrow	We heard and saw several
Savannah Sparrow	We heard and saw several
Song Sparrow	We heard many of these and saw several
Lincoln's Sparrow	One of these heard and seen well
Swamp Sparrow	We heard and saw several

White-throated Sparrow	Many heard and seen - for many, the voice of the northern forest
Dark-eyed Junco	Only a few of these encountered - a sweet, jingly song
Northern Cardinal	Getting far north for this species, but we heard one!
Rose-breasted Grosbeak	Two heard and seen
Indigo Bunting	One heard
Bobolink	Several seen and heard doing their R2D2 calls
Red-winged Blackbird	This species is certainly common - we heard and saw many!
Common Grackle	This species is certainly common - we heard and saw many!
Purple Finch	We were able to hear several of New Hampshire's state bird
American Goldfinch	We only found three!
Evening Grosbeak	Two of these were heard flying over
House Sparrow	Several heard at urban sites
Non-avian Creatures	
Black Bear	One seen on the Cannon Mountain slopes - a big one!
Moose	Two seen roadside
White-tailed Deer	One seen crossing the road
Snowshoe Hare	One seen
Eastern Red Squirrel	Several seen
Eastern Chipmunk	Several seen - good to be able to recognize their call
Garter Snake	One seen
Spring Peeper	Many heard
Gray Tree Frog	Also heard
Green Frog	The frog with the "banjo-string" call
American Toad	Trilling, and hopping across the trail
